Why Judge Alito should be confirmed

Editor -- Judge Samuel A. Alito Jr. listened to us regarding the little-known "no-citation rule" by which the Ninth Circuit U.S. Court of Appeals makes 85 percent of its own decisions illegal to mention in our courts. As chairman of the Federal Appellate Rules



Committee, he moved against strong opposition to abolish these rules because they conflict with basic principles underlying the rule of law.

Neither The Chronicle, nor any California judge reviewing California's similar practice, has demonstrated such a commitment to the rule of law, which, in our view, is far more important than Alito's position on any particular issue. He should be confirmed.
